"It takes a fair bit of organising and we're only a small committee so there are aspects that would be a bit easier if we had a bigger volunteer base but we had some good engagement over the week-end," she said. "The art-based events are quite a favourite and they really broaden the scope of what we're trying to achieve, of turning Lake Hawthorn into a beloved

asset of the region.

"As an organisation we're always trying to get the community engaging with the space and taking these small steps to move towards something really positive."
